Fly in 4



- *It's a Temple thing!* Class of 2029 is the 12th class to enter under Fly in 4
- Easy to opt in! More than 47,000 students have accepted this agreement!
 - Click on link to the Fly in 4 Agreement provided on the Next Steps channel on TUportal.
 - Accept agreement anytime between now and end of add/drop period
- **Do what successful students do!** Meet the checkpoints:
 - Consult with an academic advisor **every** semester
 - Register for the next semester during the priority registration period
 - Advance in class standing each year and select courses consistent with academic plan
 - Complete a graduation review by the end of year 3 and be on track to graduate
- *It works!* Fly in 4 students are more likely to:
 - complete more credits and earn higher GPAs
 - advance in class standing, stay on track in their major, and graduate in 4 years

• Fly in 4 is like an insurance policy

If students meet all checkpoints and can't graduate in 4 years due to the unavailability of required courses, Temple will pay for remaining required course(s)

Can I double major, change majors, or study abroad under Fly in 4?

All these things may be possible with careful planning. Fly in 4 ensures consistent check-ins with advisors so you know exactly what you need to do to stay on track, even as opportunities and setbacks emerge.

What if I am interested in +1 or other accelerated programs?

By design, students in these programs earn a bachelor's degree after the first 4 years, and thus are still eligible for Fly in 4. In fact, the "consult with an advisor" checkpoint is a great opportunity to discuss your interest in applying to an accelerated program and plan your schedule accordingly.

What if I think or know I will take longer than 4 years to graduate?

Fly in 4 provides you with tools and checkpoints that help you stay on track for *your* academic plan, including advising, class offerings when you need them, and a dedicated dashboard to track your progress. Even if you may need more than four years to graduate, we encourage you to opt in and take advantage of these tools to help you graduate as soon and efficiently as possible.

The Bursar's Office generates the *balance due notification for your student account*, which includes charges for tuition, fees, housing and meal plan charges.








TUpay is Temple University's official online student account and payment system. TUpay is accessed through TUPortal.

- View your current balance and payment due date
- Access real-time view of your student account
- Make payment by electronic check or credit card
- Check refund status and sign-up for direct deposit
- Create an Authorized Payer (parent, etc.)
 - An Authorized Payer is someone that a student grants access to TUpay on his/her behalf. They have the same TUpay functions as students.

Optional Tuition Insurance – New Program!

- Temple University partnered with GradGuard to offer optional tuition insurance.
- The GradGuard Tuition Insurance plan helps students and their families overcome financial losses that may result from an event which forces students to withdraw due to a covered reason anytime during the semester.
- Covered withdraws include serious injury, chronic illness, mental health conditions, loss of employment of a tuition payer, and death of a payer.
- After charges are posted for the semester, students and Authorized Payers will be presented with an opportunity to purchase GradGuard's tuition insurance through TUpay.
- This insurance policy is entirely voluntary and is not offered, sold, endorsed, administered, or guaranteed by Temple University.

Paying Your Tuition and Fees

- Fall balance due notifications are issued starting the 3rd week of July to our student's Temple email address and the Authorized Payer's email address
- No charges will appear until students have registered for classes
- Newly registered students (after the 3rd week of July) will receive balance due notifications on the Monday following registration
- Due date is in September after Labor Day

Ways To Pay



- Online (TUpay) (electronic check and credit card)
 - Credit card payments are subject to 2.85% convenience fee from the vendor in addition to the payment amount
- Payments by mail (check only)
 - Temple University Bursar's Office

- Payments in-Person (cash, check or money order)
- **PA 529 College Savings Programs** If you participate in either the Guaranteed Savings Plan or Investment Plan programs, you must first contact the program to request that a payment be issued to Temple University.
- International payments Flywire-Students can make international payments with real-time currency conversion. This service offers 24-hour support in multiple languages.

Temple Installment Payment Plan (TIPP)

T

- TIPP is an interest-free pre-payment plan administered on behalf of the University by Nelnet Campus Commerce.
- The plan allows Temple students to make up to ten scheduled monthly payments starting in May towards their future charges (five payments for the fall and five payments for the spring).
- Students can finance all or a portion of their charges by paying the non-refundable \$80 annual application fee to enroll in the payment plan.
- Payment methods are by electronic check (ACH) or credit card that will be automatically debited from the account on the 16th of each month.
- Credit card payments are subject to 2.85% convenience fee by Nelnet.

Deferred Payment Plan



- For the fall and spring semesters, students who do not pay the total account balance will be automatically enrolled in the University's Deferred Payment Plan.
- The Deferred Payment Plan provides additional time to pay your balance.
- Students will be assessed a \$50 non-refundable payment plan fee each semester if the total account balance is not paid by the semester due date. Students do not have to sign up for this payment plan.
- If students are automatically enrolled in the Deferred Payment Plan for fall and spring, the annual fee is \$100.

Signing Up as An Authorized Payer



- Creating an Authorized Payer is critical for the student to do.
- An Authorized Payer is someone such as a parent that a student grants access to view his/her account and make payments in TUpay.


Things to Remember When Your Student Calls Home:





Temple Culinary Services: Meal Plan Overview

What is a meal plan?

A meal plan unlocks delicious meals, coffee, snacks, and more at Temple Culinary Services locations across main campus. Each meal plan includes *meal swipes* that are conveniently preloaded onto one's *OWLcard* or mobile wallet.

- Weekly meal plans provide a weekly allowance of meal swipes, resetting each Sunday at 12:01 a.m.
- **Block meal plans** provide a bundle of meal swipes, which expire at the end of the semester

Who is required to purchase a meal plan?

New students (first-year and transfer) with housing contracts on main campus are required to purchase a weekly meal plan with a minimum of **12 meals per week**. If no meal plan is chosen, the *Weekly 12* will be assigned by default for *both* the fall and spring semesters.

What are Guest Meals?

Guest meals are included in our *Unlimited*, *Weekly 15*, *Weekly 12*, and *Weekly 10* meal plans and can be used to treat friends and family **exclusively at Esposito Dining Center in Johnson and Hardwick Halls**. You can use as many guest meal swipes as you'd like until the limit included in your meal plan is met.



Temple Culinary Services: Meal Plan Overview

What is a meal swipe?

Meal swipes are meals included in your meal plan, which can be used two ways:

- to enjoy **all-you-care-to-eat dining** at Esposito Dining Center in Johnson and Hardwick Halls
- as **meal equivalency**, a credit toward the purchase of à la carte food items at select retail locations (excluding coffee and convenience outlets)

How much is a meal swipe worth when used as meal equivalency?

When used as meal equivalency, the value of a meal varies by meal period:

- During breakfast (from open until 10:59 a.m.): \$7.60
- During lunch (11:00 a.m. to 3:59 p.m.), dinner (4:00 p.m. to 7:59 p.m.), and 4th meal (8:00 p.m.to close): \$10.50

A second meal swipe, cash, or credit can be used to cover any remaining balance.

How often can I use a meal swipe?

You can use a single meal swipe in our all-you-care-to-eat dining location and up to 2 meal swipes per transaction in retail settings (excluding coffee and convenience outlets) with a maximum meal swipe allowance of 4 meals per meal period – until the limit included in your meal plan is met.

If your meal plan includes **guest meals**, you can use them to treat others to a meal *exclusively at Esposito Dining Center in Johnson and Hardwick Halls*. Otherwise, you're welcome to treat friends and family to a meal using **cash** or **credit** at any of our campus dining locations.

Does my meal plan selection carry over from fall to spring?

- **Students required to purchase a meal plan** will make both their fall and spring meal plan selections in summer, prior to the fall/spring meal plan selection deadline. They are then able to make changes to their selection prior to the meal plan changes deadline each semester.
- **Students not required to purchase a meal plan** are able to sign up for a meal plan at any time. We encourage students to make their selection as early as possible. Only the cost of weekly meal plans can be prorated when purchased after the start of the semester.

How do I cancel my meal plan?

Students may apply for a release from the Dining Services Agreement with supporting documentation stating the reason for their release request. Releases are only considered for medical and/or religious reasons. Requests are reviewed and decided by the University on a case-by-case basis. If a student's request for release is denied, they will remain responsible for all fees associated with their meal plan, whether used or not.

- **To apply for a release**, log into *MyHousing* via the *TUportal*.
- For questions about meal plan cancellations, please contact University Housing and Residential Life during normal business hours, from Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The team can also be reached via phone at (215) 204-7184 (Option #2) or via email at housing@temple.edu.






